Sri Vardhamaneswarar Temple, Thirupugalur

This is the 193rd Thevaram Paadal Petra Shiva Sthalam and the 76th sthalam on the south side of the river Kaveri of Chozha Nadu. This temple is inside the Thirupugalur Sri Agnipureeswarar temple. This is one of the 44 temples to which Moovar has sung hymns to Lord Shiva of this temple. Thirunavukkarasu Swamigal has attained mukthi in this place. This Thirupugalur is also the birthplace of Muruga Nayanar, one of the 63 Nayanmars. This is the Sathayam Nakshatra temple.

In Periyapuram, Sekkizhar records that Thirugnanasambandar came to this temple after worshipping Lord Shiva of Thiruchengattankudi. Moolavar : Sri Varthamaneecharar Consort : Sri Manonmani

Some of the salient features of these temples are..... The temple faces east with a Moat/agazhi around, believed to be excavated by Banasuran. The first level, Rajagopuram, is of 5 tiers, and the second level is of 3 tiers. In between the two Rajagopurams, Dwajasthambam, balipedam, and Rishabam. Both Thirupugalur and Thirupugalur Varthamaneecharam are side by side. Moolavar looks cute. There are no koshta murtis.

Muruganayanar Sannathi is on the left. Ambal Manonmani is in a separate sannathi.

HISTORY AND INSCRIPTIONS

Since Moovar has sung hymns in praise of Lord Shiva of this temple, this original temple might have existed before the 7th century. The same was reconstructed as a stone temple during the Chozhas period (maybe during Rajaraja-I -I) and further extended by Pandya, Vijayanagaras, and Nattukottai Nagarathars.

As per the inscriptions Thirunavukkarasu Swamigal was called as "Kulichezhuntha Nayanar", Muruga Nayanar madam was called as "Nambi Nayanar Thirumadam -", Thiruneelakanda Yazhpanar was called as "Yazhmuri Nayanar, Dharumapurathu Nayanar".

LEGENDS

This is the birthplace of Muruga Nayanar, one of the 63 Nayanmars. He served the temple by offering flowers to the temple. Thirugnanasambandar praises Muruga Nayanar's service in his hymns. It is believed that Muruga Nayanar also attained mukti along with Thirugnanasambandar at Thirunallur Perumanam.

On Chitra Sathayam Thithi Thirunavukkarasar had attained Mukti in this sthalam, hence a 10-day festival is celebrated. This is the birthplace of Muruga Nayanar. This is one of the seven Lord Shiva temples, and all of them are Paadal Petra Sthalams, which end with "Charam".

Thiru Mundeecharam, Thiru Patteeswaram, Thiru Naraiyur Siddheecharam, Thiru Kondeecharam, Thiru Pugalur Vardhamaneecharam, Thiru Ramadeecharam and, Thiru Ketheecharam.

According to a resident Palani the driver steered the truck to the left. At that point, the truck ran over a rainwater drain. The lid on the rainwater drain broke due to heavy weight of the truck.

Following this, the lorry fell to one side. Following this, a 'crane' was called and the lorry was removed. The incident caused traffic congestion on the roads adjacent to the area.

Have your pet dog microchipped?

Despite multiple deadline extensions given by the Greater Chennai Corporation (GCC) to microchip pet dogs, only around 54% of pet dogs have been licensed so far, against 1.05 lakh registered online with the civic body.

Pet licensing was made mandatory by the GCC to curb abandonment of dogs and ensure accountability among pet owners. It conducted 67 days of special camps to assist pet owners with licensing and microchipping.

Following the conclusion of camps held at Animal Birth Control centres from October 8, around 57,626 pet dogs were licensed over 67 days. To facilitate compliance, the civic body had extended the original November 24 deadline first to December 7 and later to December 14. In the final phase, from December 12-14, the GCC added 8 more camps, in addition to the existing ones at 7 locations, including 6 pet clinics. In a statement on Sunday, the GCC said licences were issued to 2,930 owners at the camps for rabies vaccination and microchipping held at 15 locations.

The GCC will begin imposing a fine of Rs 5,000 on owners who haven't microchipped their dogs. However, they will also be allowed to avail licence after inserting microchip at 6 GCC clinics." The enforcement drive will focus on dogs taken out without leashes in public places such as bus stands, schools and other crowded areas. "Enforcement teams will scan the dogs and if they are not microchipped, fines will be imposed immediately," he added. "Door-to-door verification will also be carried out to strengthen enforcement." Some owners welcomed the awareness created by the camps. R Manichan, a resident of Jafferkanpet, said, "The crowd was manageable on the final day and the process was smooth. Extending the deadline has been very helpful".

Corpn plans biogas plants in schools

The Greater Chennai Corporation (GCC) is planning to introduce biogas plants in its schools to encourage the use of clean energy for cooking and to sensitise students to sustainable waste management practices.

The initiative will focus on campuses that have

centralized kitchens preparing meals for multiple institutions, allowing maximum utilization of kitchen waste and cooking gas generated from it.

Chennai Corporation Commissioner J. Kumaragurubaran said the civic body intends to collaborate with willing non-governmental organisations, individuals and residents' welfare association to implement the project. The move is expected to reduce dependence on LPG cylinders and bring down cooking fuel costs in schools.

As a pilot, the GCC is considering setting up biogas plants at four cloud kitchens where large quantities of vegetable and food waste are generated daily. These facilities would be integrated with composting and biogas units and can be established at an optimal cost without requiring extensive maintenance hours, the commissioner said.

The plan follows the successful installation of a biogas plant at a Corporation higher secondary school in South Chennai late last month. The 75-kg capacity unit was installed on the campus with support from a local residents' association and a service organisation at a cost of Rs 5.7 lakh. The school houses a kitchen that prepares breakfast for around 10 Corporation schools. Currently connected to a single stove, the plant processes about 15 to 20 kg of food waste each day and generates enough gas to meet a portion of the cooking requirement. The system is estimated to save one LPG cylinder every two months. About 250 students on the campus benefit directly from the initiative, and students are also introduced to the working of the plant as part of environmental awareness activities.

A similar biogas facility was set up last year at another Corporation school in Adyar with the support of a residents' association and an environmental organisation. School staff reported that the plant helped save seven LPG cylinders over 10 months. During this time, around 3,200 kg of food and wet waste were diverted from disposal, and the biogas produced was used for cooking for nearly 270 hours. Apart from reducing LPG consumption, biogas plants also generate slurry that can be converted into compost. This manure can be used for gardening and small-scale food cultivation on school campuses, helping create a closed-loop, self-sustaining system that combines waste management, energy generation and environmental education.

Free MTC passes for senior citizens

The MTC has announced that senior citizens aged 60 years and above will be eligible for free travel tokens starting December 21. Each beneficiary will receive 10 free travel tokens a month.

Tokens for the January-June period next year will be distributed between December 21 and January 31 at 42 bus terminals and depots, including Pattinapakkam, Besant Nagar, Thiruvannamiyur, Adyar, T Nagar, Saidapet, Broadway, Tambaram, among others. After January 31, the tokens will be issued at the respective bus depots and bus stands. The facility is available only to residents within the jurisdiction served by MTC buses, a release said.

Absconding murder accused appeared in court

Absconding rowdy Azhaguraja surrendered in court on Sunday.

In January, police tried to catch Azhaguraja, who was driving a car in Tiruvallur district. At that time, the incident caused a stir when a policeman who was hanging from his car slipped and fell.

Rowdy Azhaguraja, who was still at large, surrendered at the Third Additional Sessions Court in Chennai. The court has ordered him to be detained in Cuddalore jail. The police took Azhaguraja to Omanthur Government Hospital for a medical examination.

The Chennai One app continues to introduce various incentives to increase digital adoption among public transport users.

Rs. 5 lakh fine for dumping construction waste

The Chennai Corporation has warned that a fine of up to Rs 5 lakh will be imposed if construction waste is not properly disposed of.

The Chennai Corporation has issued a statement regarding this:

As per the Corporation's guidelines, all construction materials, excavated soil, construction and demolition waste must be stored only within the premises where construction work is taking place.

Dumping on public roads, sidewalks, and roadsides is prohibited. Fines will be imposed on those who violate the rules.

Accordingly, a fine of Rs 25,000 will be imposed for a building area of 500 square meters to 20,000 square meters. For a building area exceeding that, a fine of up to Rs 5 lakh will be imposed.

It states this. At the same time, the Corporation has stated that construction waste is being handled responsibly in constructions of less than 500 square meters.



Discount on monthly travel passes via Chennai One App

To promote digital transactions across Chennai's public transport system, the Chennai Unified Metropolitan Transport Authority (CUMTA) has announced a special discount for commuters purchasing monthly travel passes through the 'Chennai One' mobile application.

Currently, around 70,000 commuters travel using 1,000 and 2,000 monthly unlimited travel passes across

Road encroachment a perennial problem in Vadapalani Murugan Temple

Devotees suffer due to encroachment on both sides of footpath near Vadapalani Murugan Temple. This Murugan temple is crowded all time with devotees and specially during weekends and special days. Devotees usually wait in long queues to have darshan of the Lord.

Andavar Street is the main road leading from Arcot Road to the temple facade. Flower, garland, coconut and food stalls are sprouting here and there on the sidewalks and roads on both sides of this street. Moreover, many people are occupying the road itself and setting up shops.

Customers coming to the shops also occupy the road and park the vehicles haphazardly even though there is a paid parking nearby. This makes it difficult for devotees to reach the temple entrance.



Smart water meters to be installed in 1 Lakh buildings in Chennai

Chennai Metrowater is set to introduce smart water meters in nearly one lakh buildings across the city from early next year to promote efficient water use and improve demand-side management. Tenders for the project are expected to be finalised by the end of this month.

In the initial phase, smart meters will be installed in water-intensive users, including commercial establishments, industries, multi-storied buildings, and large individual houses measuring over 2,500 sq. ft. The ₹392.59-crore project will cover both core and merged areas of Chennai.

Around 22,000 smart meters have already been installed, and monthly billing will be generated based on actual water consumption using IoT technology. Chennai Metrowater currently serves about 17 lakh consumers.

The project, announced in the 2024-25 budget, faced delays due to field studies, technology selection, and the tender process. It will be implemented under the Hybrid

Annuity Model (HAM), with the concessionaire responsible for installation, meter reading, and maintenance for 15 years.

Officials said the initiative aims to reduce non-revenue water and improve operational efficiency, with plans to cover 80% of domestic connections by 2027.



Chennai MRTS-Metro Merger expected soon

A long-awaited proposal to merge Chennai's Mass Rapid Transit System (MRTS) with the Chennai Metro Rail Limited (CMRL) is nearing completion. Senior government officials and Southern Railway authorities have met to finalise a memorandum of understanding (MoU), expected to be signed within the next week.

The merger will transfer MRTS assets, operations, and maintenance from Southern Railway to the state government and CMRL, enabling integrated operations, unified ticketing, and seamless services under a single urban rail operator. The takeover is planned to roll out phased over the next two years.

In the initial phase, CMRL plans to induct 25 air-conditioned broad-gauge rakes for the elevated MRTS corridor. The operating model will be similar to Delhi

Metro's broad-gauge system. Services on the Velachery to St Thomas Mount line may begin by January 2026, as the line nears completion.

CMRL's CUMTA is preparing detailed station-wise plans to modernise the 18 MRTS stations, enhancing public spaces, lighting, safety, cleanliness, and last-mile connectivity. Signalling upgrades and redesigned metro interchanges are planned for coordinated schedules and integrated ticketing.

Cost estimates for the MRTS upgrade vary. A 2018 study valued it between 2,800 crore and 3,100 crore, while current projections could exceed 4,000 crore.

Rs. 1 lakh fine for keeping pitbull and Rottweiler dogs in Chennai

A resolution was passed at the Chennai Corporation meeting to impose a fine of Rs. 1 lakh for keeping pitbulls and Rottweilers. The Chennai Corporation meeting was held Friday under the chairmanship of Mayor Priya. Various resolutions were passed in this meeting. A resolution was passed to construct restrooms with toilets for sanitation workers in 200 wards in Chennai at a cost of Rs. 25.95 crore.

Similarly, a resolution was passed to impose a fine of Rs. 1 lakh on residents of the Chennai Corporation area who keep pitbulls and Rottweilers. While there was already a ban on keeping these two breeds of dogs, steps have now been taken to impose fines on those who violate the ban.

This action has been taken following complaints that these specific dog breeds are acting aggressively beyond the control of their owners and are biting and biting people on the road.



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Renovation work incomplete: Vehicular traffic affected

In K K Nagar, traffic congestion is still occurring despite the pothole caused by a broken sewer pipe being filled and repaired.

Few months back a landslide caused a sinkhole on Ramasamy Road, which connects K.K. Nagar and Nesapakkam. The sinkhole was subsequently repaired. In this situation, a few days ago, a pothole occurred again in the same area. Subsequently, the water board officials repaired the broken underground sewer pipe and filled the pothole on the road with soil.

However, due to the work not being done properly, it has become muddy. As vehicles passing through it have tripped and fallen, a barricade has been erected in the area where the pothole was repaired.

Traffic congestion is caused by vehicles plying on the remaining roads adjacent to it. Motorists are expecting the road to be properly repaired.



GCC installing spikes covering transformer

The Chennai Corporation is now installing spikes on the view cutters covering transformers to curb the poster menace in the city. This move has received good response from the public.
